Key points from the phonics and reading information evening for parents

- The most important point is that we want children to have a love of reading and we want all children to learn to read by the end of Y1.
- Phonics is: making connections between the sounds of our spoken words and the letters that are used to write them down.
- We teach 4 sounds a week and send you the information home on a Friday so you can see what we have been learning. Once we have taught the single alphabet sounds we move onto digraphs (2 letters that make 1 sound eg. sh, oa) and trigraphs (3 letters that make 1 sound eg. igh). By the time your child reaches the end of Y1 they will have learnt the entire alphabetic code.

- Blending sounds is how we learn to read. We play lots of oral blending games where children simply blend sounds orally, for example asking children to tap their l-e-g, point to the b-i-n, can you h-o-p? as this is a skill they need before they can read.

How we teach tricky words

 Reading – children read in school in groups. They read 3 times a week and each session has a different focus:

Session 1 – decoding (sounding out and blending the words)

Session 2 - prosody (reading with expression)

Session 3 – comprehension (checking we understand what we have read)

These books then come home (on Wednesdays or Thursdays) for your children to practise and show you how well they are learning to read. Please record in their reading diary how well they do.

Then please return them on Monday mornings as other groups may need them for that week.

Reading groups will start between now and October half term.

- Your child also brings a sharing book home they can change these on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. These are for you to read to your child and enjoy together to develop that love of stories, reading and books.
