Policy Statement

St Wilfrid's CE Primary School is an inclusive community dedicated to supporting and welcoming pupils with medical conditions. Our aim is to provide equal opportunities for all pupils, ensuring they can:

- Be healthy
- Stay safe
- Enjoy and achieve
- Make a positive contribution
- Achieve economic well-being

We are committed to ensuring that all staff understand their duty of care towards children and young people in the event of a medical emergency and feel confident in their ability to act effectively. Certain medical conditions, such as asthma, cancer, diabetes, and epilepsy, can be serious and potentially life-threatening if not properly managed.

This policy supports pupils with medical needs, promotes regular attendance, and ensures they are not denied access to education, school trips, or extracurricular activities because of their medical condition. It has been revised in accordance with the *Children and Families Act 2014* and *Supporting Pupils at School with Medical Conditions* (DfE, 2015).

Responsibilities

Parents and Carers

- Must inform the school about any medical needs before admission or when a medical need develops.
- Work in partnership with the school and health professionals to draw up an Individual Healthcare Plan (IHP).
- Complete a consent form for any medication administered at school. Verbal instructions will not be accepted.
- Provide sufficient medication in its original container, ensure it is in date, and replace it as needed.

School Staff

- May administer medication if agreed by the Headteacher or SENCo.
- Will receive appropriate training to ensure competency. Staff are covered by the school's insurance when following procedures correctly.
- Have the right to refuse to administer medication but must understand the principles and legal liabilities if they agree.
- Must ensure pupils with medical conditions are included in all aspects of school life, unless evidence from a health professional indicates otherwise.
- Must follow emergency procedures, including calling 999 immediately in life-threatening situations and remaining with the child until help arrives.
- Will be briefed on pupils with medical conditions, particularly for off-site activities.

Local Authority and Health Professionals

- The Local Authority, school nursing service, and other NHS professionals will work in partnership with the school to ensure pupils are well supported.

Individual Healthcare Plans (IHPs)

- IHPs will be drawn up in collaboration with parents/carers, pupils (where appropriate), school staff, and health professionals.
- IHPs will include: medical condition, special requirements (e.g., dietary needs), medication details, daily care, emergency procedures, and staff responsibilities.
- IHPs must be reviewed annually or sooner if the child's needs change.

Medication Administration

Storage

- Emergency medication (e.g., inhalers, EpiPens) must be easily accessible.
- Prescription medication must be stored in a locked cabinet with restricted access.
- Controlled drugs (e.g., Ritalin) must be stored securely in a restricted-access room and recorded in a stock register.

Types of Medication

- Antibiotics: Administered at home where possible; school may administer if consented.
- Analgesics (Painkillers): Individually supplied with written parental consent. Aspirin must not be given.
- Over-the-Counter Medicines: Accepted only in exceptional circumstances, treated as prescribed medication.

Disposal of Medication

- Parents/carers are responsible for collecting or returning expired medication to a pharmacy.
- If parents do not collect, school staff may safely dispose of expired or unused medication following LA guidance.

Refusal of Medication

- If a child refuses medication, parents/carers are informed immediately. Staff cannot force medication.
- Exception: in life-threatening situations (e.g., anaphylaxis), staff will administer emergency medication immediately, prioritising preservation of life.

Specific Medical Conditions

Asthma Management

- Inhalers must be readily available, labelled, and accompanied by spacers if required. Staff will monitor use and inform parents of concerns.

Diabetes Management

- IHPs will outline how to prevent and treat hypoglycaemia. Staff will be trained to recognise and respond to episodes.

Cancer Management

- Staff should be aware of physical and emotional impacts of treatment. A key person will support the pupil, and all staff will be briefed.

Record Keeping

- A register of pupils with medical needs will be maintained for each class.
- Records include prescribed medications, consent forms, and staff signatures when medication is administered.
- Emergency medication use must be logged with time, date, and staff signature.

Training

- Staff who support pupils with medical needs receive regular training from health professionals.
- Training is updated annually or when a pupil's needs change.

Inclusion and Activities

- Pupils with medical conditions are supported to fully participate in school life, including trips, residential visits, and sports activities.
- Risk assessments will consider medical needs, and reasonable adjustments will be made.

Emergency Procedures

If a pupil needs emergency support:

1. Administer prescribed emergency medication.
2. Call 999 immediately.
3. Contact parents/carers.
4. Ensure a staff member accompanies the child to hospital if parents cannot attend.
5. Staff remain with the child until emergency services arrive.

Complaints Procedure

- Parents or pupils dissatisfied with support should follow the school's complaints procedure (available on the website).
